A creepy figure seen near the bridge watching from the shadows. Some say he's a harmless prankster, others say a warning to be careful.

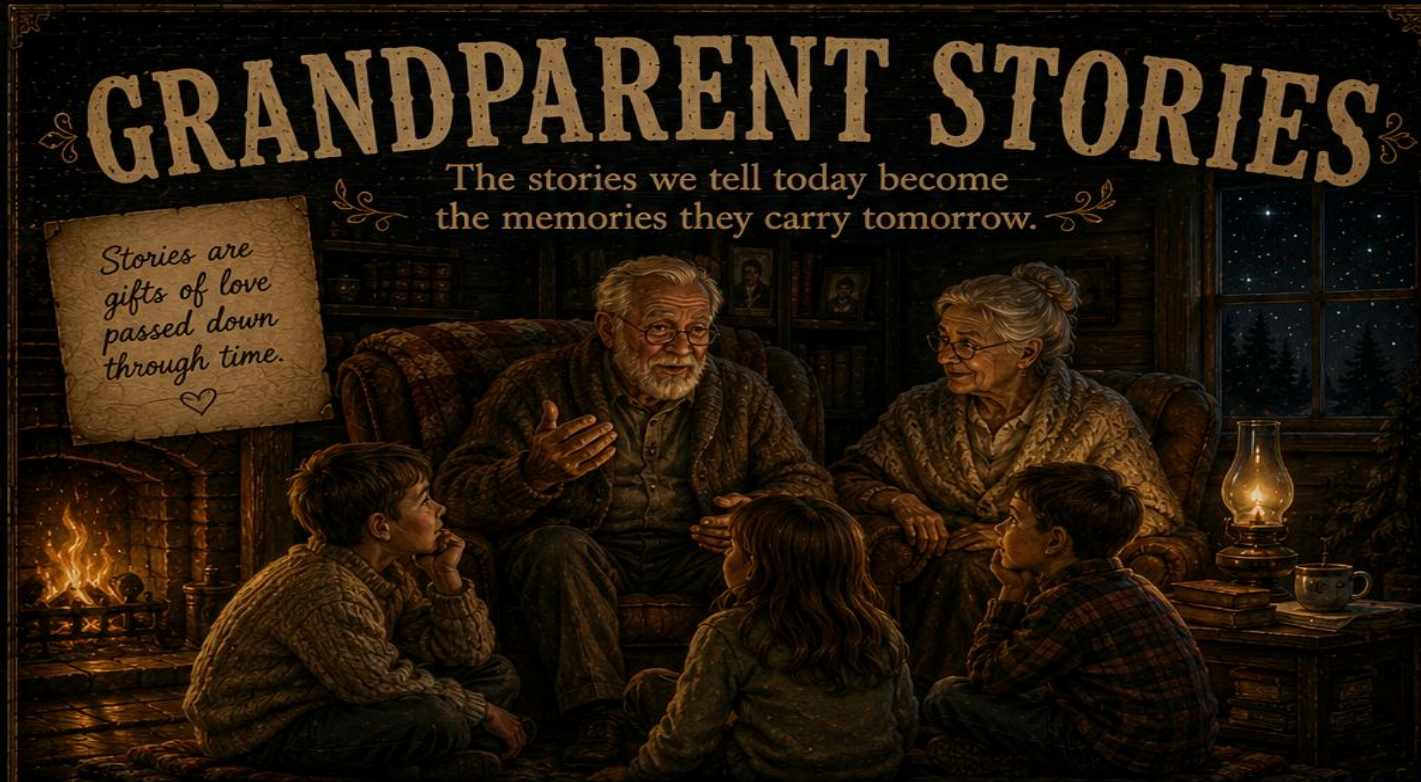
